COST: How would you compare your managerial experience of being a Grant Holder Manager before and after taking the role? Do you feel this experience enhanced your professional profile? If yes, how?

I began my role as Grant Holder Manager (GHM) for the COST Action <u>'European Topology</u> <u>Interdisciplinary Action (EUTOPIA)</u> in 2018. I was both excited and scared to be part of it. Fortunately, the COST trainings held in Brussels and the continuous support from the Administrative Officer (AO) through email and online meetings helped me learn the financial aspects of the Action from the start.

The most challenging aspect for me, as an Italian GHM, was to reconcile the COST rules with Italian laws and regulations, and to ensure prompt reimbursements to participants without being hindered by bureaucratic hurdles. It was an interesting challenge, not easy but certainly rewarding. Let's say it's like trekking in the mountains, the trail is not always easy, but it leads to peaks where you can take lots of nice photos.

I recommend taking on the GHM role, not only for the sense of fulfilment it brings but also for the opportunity to be a part of the research that the Action supports. Even if you're not directly involved in research activities, a positive synergy with the Action Chair and the Management Committee makes you feel like an essential part of the complex world of research that contributes to making our world a better place.
