## What is COST (CO-operation in Science & Technology)?

- Set up in 1971
- Longest-running pan-European intergovernmental framework
- dedicated to networking activities for European researchers across all scientific disciplines
- 38 (+1) COST Countries (from 19 COST Countries in 1971) and beyond
- Bottom-up approach



#### Description

Unpleasant taste and odor (T&O) of water can indicate quality problems or possible risks for human health and can make water unacceptable by consumers. A plethora of water T&O of natural or anthropogenic origin can enter water at the source, during water treatment or in distribution networks. Resolution of water T&O problems requires integration of a) sensory analysis to describe the problem. b) chemical analysis to determine the identity and concentration of T&O c) assessment of associated risks and d) suitable water treatment to control T&O. Expertise in Europe across those dimensions are yet scattered and fragmented. The main aim of the proposed Action (TOPWATER) is to increase capabilities and capacities in Europe for solving water T&O, by creating the first European network of multi-disciplinary experts, end-users and stakeholders in the field. An 'innovation by integration' approach is adopted, incorporating novel cross-sector knowledge transfer from the food sector, new international collaborations, vertical 'source to tap' risk assessment strategies and horizontal integration with overlapping sectors, i.e. aquaculture, manufacturers of materials in contact with water, sensors and analytical technologies. TOPWATER will have strong impact in improving protection of public health and water resources, quality of life, use of tap water, consumer's awareness and involvement in water quality issues and professional development of young researchers in the field. It will largely contribute to the implementation of the new (recast) EU Drinking Water Directive and to the development of European leadership in the science and technology of water quality.





## Daily Allowance (DA) covers:

- Hotel
- Meals
- Local travel in meeting country

#### Based on:

- Meeting country 160-200 EUR
- Travel times
- Meals offered by Local Organiser (-10% deducted per provided meal)

#### The MC can lower DA

Training Schools: trainers and trainees can have different DA



#### Reimbursement

Local organiser Support (LOS)

#### **Two Modalities:**

1. Up to 5000 €: Lump sum (no receipts) of 20 EUR per person per day, based on signed attendance list

OR

2. Up to 10 000 €: Receipts and invoices;

VAT is ineligible

Entangled histories (Espagne, Kocka, Werner, Zimmermann) have explored 'mutual influencing', 'reciprocal or asymmetric perceptions', and the intertwined 'processes of constituting one another'. In his highly informed interdisciplinary work Mediterranean Crossings: The Politics of an Interrupted Modernity (Duke University Press, 2008), lain Chambers has provided a timely reminder that the Mediterranean is a fusion of European, African and Asian influences. He explores what he calls the 'liquid materiality' of the area: the ways in which 'overlapping territories and intertwined histories' suggest 'the making of a more multiple Mediterranean', where borders are 'both transitory and zones of transit'. The Mediterranean is an extensive geopolitical space which has long acted as a flexible locus of exchange for a multitude of cultural transactions. In it, North, South, East and West are all 'entangled in a cultural and historical net cast over centuries, even millennia'.

The workshop will integrate two perspectives in terms of contact zones, by relating cross-imperial boundaries, contacts and transfers as well as religious boundaries within given multi-confessional societies. The central question will be what role religion played in shaping emotions and repertoires of emotion and perceptions thereof, including how to make sense of irrational emotions. How are similarities and differences of regimes of body language and emotional registers and economy explained in religious terms? How are religious traditions and formations in multi-confessional contexts inscribed in non-religious practices? When do such perceptions change and how do we as historians measure such change? To this end, the workshop will address issues of methodology and historical case studies, in which Islam will play a special, though not exclusive role. Methodologically, the focus will be on the tangibility of religious sentiments in given materials and practices (Muslim, Jewish, Orthodox, Catholic, and rejections thereof). As for empirical studies, the workshop will focus on case studies involving the complex relationship of body, religious practice and emotion, including sentiments disavowing the impact of religion on the economy of emotion and religious sentiments.



#### Description

PIMo is a four-year global research project undertaken by scholars from the humanities and social sciences, including historians, scholars of literary, visual, and material culture, philosophers, mathematicians, and maritime, biological, and biobehavioral sciences. It addresses the entangled histories of displacement of human subjects within and from the Mediterranean from the fifteenth to twentieth centuries. The project provides a critical historical context and understanding for the current migration crisis in Europe in terms of the intensity of emotional responses of displaced peoples and the communities they orbit and join, It investigates multiple historical case studies of the movement of people through religious persecution, slavery and indentured labour, trade, exploration, and imperialism, curiosity, and environmental and social catastrophe. Within the deeply entangled or intertwined history and cultures of the Mediterranean, the project introduces the term 'displacement' as a way to reconceptualise the movement of people with awareness, historical acuity, and compassion. Attending to the phenomenon of displacement as a connective tissue of human experience does not presume (or judge) the conditions of movement (voluntary or involuntary), but seeks to recover and understand individuals and communities in light of their particular experiences of re/location. By tracing the entangled movement of people—and the objects, writing, and ideas that accompany them—this project understands displacement and dislocation as shared human experience, while remaining attentive to its geographical, political, and historical specificities.

#### **Emotions make history**



Emotions are part and parcel of all aspects of daily life, and as such are being increasingly debated across the social sciences and humanities. This also holds true for migration studies: mixed and contrasting emotions and feelings such as hope and nostalgia, guilt and ambition, affection and disaffection (to name but a few) are an integral part of migrants' life experiences.

The emotional side of the migrant condition still seems relatively understudied. This is partly due to the dominance of economic and political analyses of migration, which tend to downplay emotional factors or overlook them altogether. But the decision to migrate entails both economic motivations and social and emotional constraints.

Some of the most emotive issues of our times concern not so much the migrant condition as the politics of the migrant phenomenon: the plight of asylum seekers and refugees tests the limits of trust and compassion; the capacity of societies to integrate multiethnic and multifaith denominations in the face of extremism and acts of terror have put multicultural social policy on trial.










### Get Involved
